O Introduction to subjects

Police Science Major

1) Studies in Police Science 3 credits

It examines and studies the main theories and practices of police organizations and police activities in general according to the ideology and values of the police.

2) Private Investigation and detective science 3 credits

Academic theoretical exploration and practical techniques are reviewed in-depth in the field of collecting and analyzing necessary data and information of clients through investigation activities of various tasks delegated within the legal scope.

3) Research Methods in criminology 3 credits

Research methods in criminology will introduce to students scientific ways of understanding crime and causes of crime. This course is designed to be an introduction to research methodology, with a strong emphasis placed on quantitative methods. We will cover a broad range of topics that begin with simple methodological concepts and will move through some more advanced material. By the end of the course, you should have a strong background in measurement, sampling, research design, and quantitative analysis.

4) Criminological Theories 3 credits

This introductory course explores the phenomena and causes of crime in a theoretical manner.

5) Basic Statistics 3 credits

This introductory course teaches you how to statistically think about concepts that are essential for learning from data and communicating insights.

6) Seminar in Crime Prevention Policy 3 credits

This course reviews theories and strategies for the cause and response of crime, various discussions and policies for crime prevention, and the latest theories and strategies, and discusses various topics.

7) Criminal Psychology 3 credits

This intermediate course examines the role of psychology in contributing to our understanding of the criminal behavior and the criminal mind associated with the commission of violent crime, homicide (multiple murder), sexual assault, property crime, and substance abuse.

8) Comparative Criminal Justice 3 credits

This course help students understand the criminal justice system of other countries from the comparative points of view. This course also explains the differences in the criminal justice system such as centralized and decentralized justice system, while intending to suggest the better system for the Korean criminal justice system.

9) Typology of Crime 3 credits

This course will expose students to traditional and new types of crimes by the different angle or in the side research crime phenomenon. Not only does the course discuss street crimes, but also white-collar crime, emerging sex crimes, and human trafficking will be studied in global perspective.

10) Public Safety Policy 3 credits

This course discusses current issues based on knowledge of the criminal justice system, including police, prosecutors, courts, and corrections. Also it approaches the efficiency and effectiveness of policies from a legal perspective.

11) Victimology 3 credits

This course provides an introductory examination of criminal victimization via an overview of current theory, research, and trends within the context of specific victimization types. We will examine specific crimes types, the impact of crime on victims and society, the role of victims within the criminal justice system, specific remedies, and victim rights and services. We will engage in many of these topics within a context of current events and local models of crime victim services.

12) Special research on police law 3 credits

This course studies various theories and precedents in the fields of police action law, constitutional rights, and international criminal law, and improves the ability to apply them creatively and comprehensively to realistic issues.

13) Studies in Police and Community Relations 3 credits

The police-community relationship model, major theories and programs of community police activities, the role and responsibility of the community for crime prevention are considered, and effective police-community models are studied.

14) Police and Psychology 3 credits

This advanced subject learns how to understand police organizations from an organizational psychological perspective and view the environment surrounding the organization from a social psychological perspective.

15) Seminar on Criminal Law 3 credits

Discussion and investigation on contents of criminal laws, developmental history of criminal laws, structure and application of criminal laws will be carried out. Furthermore, this course will promote students' understanding on how criminal laws are practiced in contemporary Korean society.
